

# Find out about Monkton Old Hall's past...

Hello! Welcome to Monkton Old Hall, my name is Griffri. I'm twelve years old. My friends usually call me Griff, you can too.

# Fact:

A **Priory** is a religious house where monks or nuns live. A monk was a holy man who gave up his life to serve God. Nuns are holy women.

The **hospitium** (say hos-pi-ti-um) is a place of shelter, or a guesthouse, at a monastery or religious house.

A **pilgrim** is a person who journeys to a holy place for religious reasons. A **Prior** is the head monk who's in charge.

Our priory is small, it only has one **prior** and four or five other monks, but there are lots of us servants to help run the priory.

Have you been outside in the garden yet? It's great!

If I get a break from the work, I whizz out there and if I'm sent out to get herbs, I run really fast so I can have a quick look at the Castle. It's the best view!

This building was built as part of the **Priory** here at Pembroke. It's the guesthouse or **hospitium**. The Priory was founded in 1098 but the hospitium was built later. No one is exactly sure when it was built, but right now, its 1400, so I live over 600 years before you. Crazy, eh! In my time, Wales isn't really part of England yet — even if King Henry IV would like it to be!

I love working here in the guesthouse's kitchen but we're kept really busy. It's a bit like a hotel, lots of people stay the night here. Most of them are pilgrims travelling to St David's. That's a small city with a beautiful cathedral on the South West tip of Wales. We have to make loads of meals for pilgrims as well as the monks.



Here are some pilgrims on their way to St. David's.



We all work hard here everyone doing their own job. One day, I'd like to be in charge of the kitchen myself. 'Cos I'm a child, I have to follow orders from everyone and I have to do all the jobs that no one else wants to do, like cleaning out the pots and pans. It's hard work, especially if the stew's been burnt. All I have is a bundle of twigs and I have to use sand to rub off all the burnt blackened bits but I can't imagine living or working anywhere else!

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Over a hundred and thirty years later than Griff's time, around 1530, King Henry VIII fell out with the Pope in Rome. Henry made a law that there were to be no more monasteries and drove everyone out of Monkton Priory! In 1539, all the main priory buildings built to worship God were knocked down because Henry wanted simpler ways to worship. Everything special in those buildings, all the treasured objects now belonged to the King, who sold it to his courtiers! Because it was only the guesthouse, Monkton Old Hall was left standing.

Over the years, Monkton Old Hall became much less important and it became a farmhouse. After that, it became very neglected. Local people put their rubbish in the cellar under the hall. The building came to be used as a rubbish dump – how sad is that?

This story has a happy ending though. An amazing woman called Miss Muriel Thompson bought the Old Hall in 1933. She loved the house and had lots of energy. She earned her living writing about gardens for magazines and she created a beautiful garden. To begin with, she had very little money and she would go and collect **driftwood** from the beach and bring it back in a trailer behind her car. She used the driftwood to make chairs and tables which were the right size for the big rooms and which didn't cost her much! Clever, eh?



# Fact:

**Driftwood** is wood that is found floating on the sea or washed ashore onto the beach.

Miss Thompson's goddaughter, Cheryl Campbell gave Monkton Old Hall to the Landmark Trust in 1979. That's why you can be here today, enjoying a holiday in the old hospitium of the priory – just like the pilgrims!

Monkton Old Hall has been in place for over six centuries. We think it was built in the 1300s. That's over 600 years ago! We're not sure exactly when Monkton Old Hall was built. There aren't any parts of the house that are dateable. We often use **dendrochronology** but at Monkton none of the timbers or beams are original.

What is dendrochronology? (say dend-row-cron-ologee).

Scientists can use this process to work out how old the trees that made the beams in a building are... but at Monkton, all the timber was renewed in the 19th Century.

Timber is wood used in a building.



# What is Monkton Old Hall built from?

Stone is the solid foundation of the earth. It exists as huge mountains, rocks, stones or small pebbles washed smooth by water. There are lots of different types of stone, with different colours and textures. Some are better to build with than others.

# Fact:

Some buildings were built from stone that was dug out of the ground when farmers ploughed the fields, other buildings were made from stone that was quarried and cut into neat shapes and sizes. There are still many stone quarries around the country today, where people get stone out of the ground.


Stone houses were once cheaper to build than brick ones. Once we could transport bricks up and down the country on the canals and railways, brick buildings become cheaper and more popular.



Monkton was built when stone was still taken out of the ground by hand. Today, a quarry is a place where stone is blasted out of the ground with explosives! The one in the picture shows what quarries look like now.





People who work with stone are called stonemasons. They build walls, carve the stone into shapes or add patterns to its surface. They use a mallet and special tools called chisels to shape the stone. The picture on the left shows a stonemason hard at work.






The size and shape of windows tells you a lot about the age and style of the building. What type of windows does Monkton Old Hall have?






Fact:

Have you seen that in some very old buildings the windows don't open? Imagine how hot it got in the summer! When the casement window was invented it was the first type of window to open.











Entrances can be grand or simple. Which front door is most like the one at Monkton Old Hall?





# Make a traditional Welsh Rarebit (easy!)

The cheese needed for a good Welsh Rarebit uses a harder cheese than was made in Wales so the Welsh had to swap their sheep for hard Cheddar from England.

Here's a simple recipe for you to try. You will probably need the help of an adult.

#### Ingredients:

4 slices of bread

225g grated, hard cheese like

Cheddar

1 tbsp butter

4 tbsp milk (or beer!)

2 tsp Worcestershire sauce, if you like

1 level tsp mustard, if you like

2 tsp flour

Shake of pepper

Pre-heat the oven: fan 140 °C or electric 160 °C: Gas 3

- Put the cheese, butter, Worcestershire sauce, mustard, flour and pepper into a saucepan.
- Mix well and then add the milk or beer to moisten.
- Stir over a gentle heat until all is melted. Stop stirring when it becomes a thick paste.
- Leave to cool for a few minutes while you toast the bread on one side (if possible).
- Spread the rarebit paste over the untoasted side and put under a hot grill until it starts to bubble and go brown in places. Doesn't that smell good! Make sure you let it cool down a bit before you eat it.

Since ancient times flags have been used to identify groups of people, countries and armies.

Flags are mainly used today to represent a country. Here's the Welsh flag, which you'll

probably have seen before.

Each colour has its own meaning:

Yellow: means truth, loyalty and justice White: means bravery and strength Red: means peace and honesty

Blue: means generosity

Green: means determination

Flags also have lots of different symbols: Stripe Cross Star Crescent Circle
